Global Industrial Footprint: Trends and Opportunities

Barcelona combines the strength of an industrial engine and a logistics hub



- Barcelona has a diversified and open economy. The city offers an international airport, the port, the trade fair, Zona Franca (logistics, industrial area and a logistics platform), which altogether offer huge potential as a Mediterranean logistics hub
- In 2018, the Catalan territory was the home of approximatly 8.600 foreign companies headquarters. The main countries of origin were Germany (13.1%) and the United States (11.7%). Companies such as Nestle, Seat, Basf, Bayer, Henkel, Roche, Sanofi and Novartis have very significant investments in Barcelona
- In 2017, exports from the province of Barcelona reached €54,771.6 million, a new historical record in the past 7 years









Industry accounts for 21,4% of total GVA* in Catalonia



- In 2017, industry sector generated 21.4% of the *Gross Added Value in Catalonia, (European Union 19.6% and Spain 18.1%), being the region with the highest industrial development in Spain.
- In 2017, Catalonia was ranked as the 4th European region for jobs in manufacturing that involve mediumhigh to high technology intensity.
- 230,000 people worked in these activities, only after the areas of Stuttgart, Lombardy and Upper Baviera


Catalonia represents 23% of the total industrial activity in Spain



- Within Spain, Catalonia concentrates a 22.8% of the industrial activity and 22.2% of the employment, being the region with the highest industrial weight
- Barcelona has an important industrial sector and the metropolitan area - with 14% of the working population employed in industry- is home for more than half (60%) of this employment in Catalonia

Key areas include:

- · The Chemical and pharmaceuticals cluster
- · The automobile cluster
- Food production
- · Paper and graphic art






Growing focus towards industry 4.0 and digital technologies



- Barcelona and its metropolitan area are working to develop industry 4.0 using Big Data and 3D printing
- The city is also promoting digital manufacturing for schools, companies entrepreneurs and community projects
- In 2017, Barcelona Metropolitan area gathered 400,000 jobs in activities associated with industry 4.0
- The city is strongly committed to the digital technology and ICT*, with 54.000 jobs and over 2700 companies




Industry model evolving towards a more efficient and sustainable model




- The city is working towards an economic model based on efficiency and the promotion of the green and circular economy
- The health and bio sector in Barcelona are additionallly very relevant, employing 8,5% and 4,1% of the jobs in Barcelona respectively
- Catalonia holds 27% of the biotech companies in Spain, leads in investment in biotechnology R&D and has 15 university hospitals, 9 research institutes and 6,000 researchers in this field



E-commerce sales as a percentage of total retail sales should move closer to the European rate. 2018




Strategic geographical position of Barcelona for present and future connections with Europe

Strategic location and market potential

- Strategic location: the capital of the Mediterranean sea.
- Market potential: Barcelona metropolitan area with circa
 5M people, is the gate way to Southern Europe.
- Good international connections by sea, air and roads.
- Solid Infrastructure
- · Unique quality of life.

Competitiveness in costs

- Average salary level is in the lower to mid range among the most developed cities.
- Office and industrial rental prices are competitive, compared to other European cities.
- Housing is still cheaper than main European capitals.

Well positioned to generate and atract talent

- High quality education system with internationally ranked business schools: IESE and ESADE.
- The city is a talent magnet for internationals. 18.5% of the population are foreigners. The international talent attracted by the high quality standards and the interesting job offers, reinforced by the growing digital and tech ecosystem.

Tech, Digital and Knowledge Focus

- Diversified economy and traditionally very entrepreneurial.
- Growing startup hub: with 1,100 tech startups as the 5th European startup hub. In tech entrepreneurship, Barcelona is the 3rd most attractive city to set up a startup, after Berlin and London.
